











Things to Do in Fayetteville, Arkansas

Clinton House Museum

This unassuming house in Fayetteville is the first home of former President Bill Clinton and wife, Hillary. In 1975, Bill Clinton took Hillary Rodham's hand in marriage in the living room of this one-story bungalow. Today, it has become a museum where through photographs, documents and videos, you'll learn about a part of the Clintons' life that many never have — a time that isn't about being president, but about being a future president. The museum is located south of Dickson Street at 930 W. Clinton Dr. and is open Monday through Saturday. Visit clintonhousemuseum.com for more info.

Arkansas Air and Military Museum

Travel back in time when you visit the state's largest and most fascinating aviation museum. Located at Fayetteville's Drake Field, the historic hangar is one of the nation's few remaining all-wood structures from the World War II era. It holds a collection of classic aircraft in flight-service condition from the 1920s and 30s, modern planes from the post-World War II era and vintage privately owned planes on loan to the museum, like Sam Walton's first airplane he used to scout new locations for Walmart. Botanical Garden of the Ozarks

The Botanical Garden of the Ozarks is one of the state's premier public garden spaces. Continually evolving, the garden features nine displays showcasing the many woody, herbaceous and exotic plant and flower species that thrive in Northwest Arkansas. Fayetteville Farmers' Market

Arkadia Retrocade
