Beatty, NV & Death Valley

Beatty Nevada this small town is the Gateway to Death Valley, and the most scenic entrance. From here, you can tour back into history from the rollicking mining towns, and into the extremes of Death Valley.

Day One

GOLDWELL OPEN AIR MUSEUM: A museum like no other, here you will see colossal sized works of art pop off the stark contrast of their desert backdrop. The GoldWell Open Air Museum is a whimsical outdoor sculpture garden that began in 1984 and is free to the public.



RHYOLITE, now a true ghost town, was at one time the third largest community in Nevada! But the fates were not kind to the town, built entirely on speculation, and it only existed for 11 years!



Day Two

Harmony Borax Works: Take a self-guided tour and explore the historic Borax processing site, including the iconic borax wagons.

The Furnace Creek Visitors Center is an essential stop to gain additional information about the valley and to verify current road and site conditions.

Badwater Basin: is the lowest point in the western hemisphere. From there, look west to see Mt. Whitney, the highest point in the western hemisphere.

Natural Bridge: Time for a short hike! Take a short hike to the natural bridge. You might even choose to take the trailhead for a longer hike.

Artist's Drive and Artist's Palette: This location features a hillside where various minerals, each with their unique color signatures, create a landscape reminiscent of a painter's palette.



Day Three

Zabriskie Point: Begin your day with a visit to Zabriskie Point, one of the most iconic viewpoints in Death Valley. Marvel at the breathtaking and surreal landscape, with its undulating formations of golden, pink, and brown hues created by millions of years of erosion.

Dantes View: Continue your journey by heading to Dantes View, an awe-inspiring viewpoint perched at an elevation of 5,476 feet. From here, you will be treated to panoramic vistas that stretch across Death Valley and beyond.

Amargosa Opera House: Visit the historic Amargosa Opera House, a charming and unique cultural gem in the heart of the desert. This remarkable venue, built in the 1920s, offers a glimpse into the past with its beautifully preserved architecture and enchanting murals painted by the renowned artist Marta Becket.

Ash Meadows National Wildlife Refuge: Visit Ash Meadows, a rare and unique oasis located in the Mojave Desert. This refuge is home to an astonishing diversity of plant and animal life, including several species found nowhere else on Earth. Keep an eye out for the endangered pupfish, a small but resilient fish that thrives in the refuge's waters.



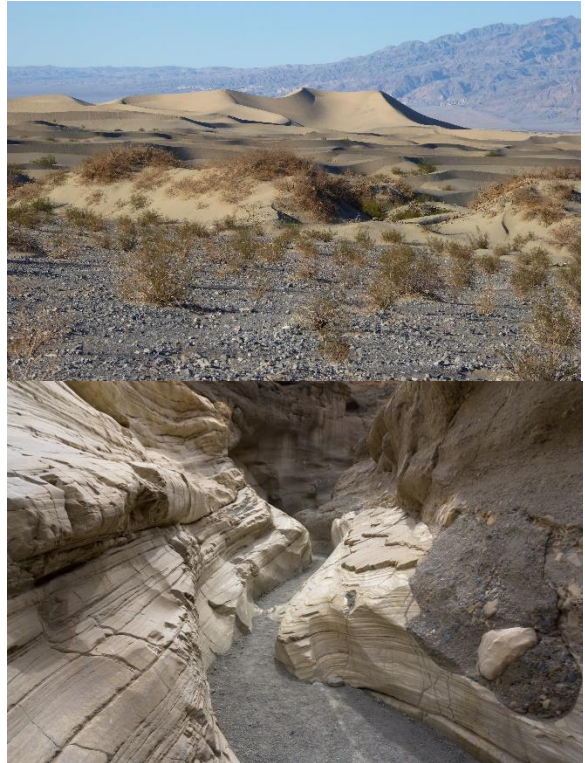
Day Four

Mesquite Sand Dunes: Begin your fourth day with a visit to the Mesquite Sand Dunes, where you can wander among the towering dunes, some of which rise over 100 feet.

Mosaic Canyon: After exploring the Mesquite Sand Dunes, make your way to Mosaic Canyon, a hidden gem renowned for its smooth, polished marble walls and narrow, winding passages.

Charcoal Kilns: The Charcoal Kilns, built in the late 1800s, are a fascinating historical site located in Wildrose Canyon. These ten beehive-shaped structures, once used to produce charcoal for the nearby Modock Mine, stand as a testament to the industrious spirit of the region's early settlers.

Darwin Falls: End your day with a visit to Darwin Falls, an oasis in the desert. This hidden waterfall, fed by a perennial stream, is a verdant contrast to the surrounding rocky terrain.



Day Five

Racetrack Playa: Experience the mysterious Racetrack Playa, a dry lakebed famous for its "sailing stones." These rocks seemingly move across the cracked surface on their own, leaving long trails behind.

Ubehebe Crater: Head to Ubehebe Crater, a massive volcanic crater that spans about half a mile wide and reaches depths of up to 600 feet.

Alluvial Fan: On your journey, be sure to visit the Alluvial Fan, an expansive and visually stunning formation created by the gradual accumulation of sediment from the surrounding mountains. This natural wonder showcases the powerful forces of erosion and deposition, offering a unique landscape that is both captivating and educational.





End each day back in the historic town of Beatty, Nevada. You may visit the Happy Burro Chili & Beer to taste their internationally award-winning chili. Alternatively, consider dining at Smokin J's BBQ, where the smoked meats are prepared daily following a traditional family recipe. Don't miss out on Eddies World, Nevada's largest candy store, which offers a diverse selection of homemade ice cream. For a more tranquil experience, you can spend an afternoon birdwatching or taking a self-guided walking tour at Torrence Ranch.
